




LOCAL 600 RETIREE CHAPTER

TOOL AND DIE BUILDING

The 35 million-dollar investment from the 2015 National Agreement is in its final stages. The plant just installed two brand new 50 ton cranes, a new CNC Lathe and one new 5 Axis Okuma Mill with one more scheduled to be installed and running by the end of the first quarter in 2019. There will also be two smaller 5-axis machines coming in 2019 and those machines will be installed in F-Aisle.

The load for the Tool and Die building will be slowing for a few months in the summertime and will pick back up in late August. From there the plant should be at full capacity the rest of the year and through 2019 with the launch of the redesigned F-150, Explorer and the all-new Bronco for 2020.

PROFIT SHARING: The first quarter of 2018 brought some good news on the profit sharing front. While the payout wasn't extremely large it was positive. The profit sharing plan was renegotiated during our last contract and this was the first quarter using the new formula. Under the terms of the new plan, we share in profits on a company-wide basis not just the profitability of Dearborn Works. This should minimize the feeling that work is being moved to another plant at our expense. Another benefit of the new plan is better transparency. The numbers used to calculate the profit sharing pool are the same as the company reports publically. Now when the company publishes the quarterly financial report we will know whether or not to expect a profit sharing payout. It seems from the first quarter results the new plan is a step in the right direction.

GIVING BACK: Big Brothers and Big Sisters Organization honored two of our Committee Members, Andrew (Drew) Minor and Dereck Whitfield, with special recognition as Outstanding Mentors. Drew and Dereck team up to mentor 3 young men at Mark Twain Elementary school in Southwest Detroit. IN-PROGRESSION WAGE INCREASES

Several questions have been raised about effective dates of pay raises and when members should expect to see wage increases. Wage increases take effect the Monday following the anniversary of the employees hire date. If your hire date is April 2, the wage increase will go into effect April 9 and pay out on April 20. This contractual language can be found in the master agreement under Appendix V.

TPT WAGE INCREASES

How does the TPT week work calculations counter for wage increases and how is it administered?

A TPT employee must have time actually worked on a day in order for that day to count as a "days worked" towards advancing the employee's week counter. The counter will advance by one week once the TPT has worked at least three days in that week. Keep in mind, TPT employees who G code early out and did not work any part of such day, will need to make up that time of work in order to get complete credit for that work week towards the wage progression. The TPT wage progression table is as follows. Please see a member on the union committee if you have any additional questions.

TPT AND STS STATUS

The committee and I have been working with the company to move as many TPT employees to STS status as possible. Things need to change with the TPT language in our national agreement. The current TPT language puts our TPT employees at a disadvantage and must be fixed at the bargaining table in 2019. Many of our TPT have been waiting patiently for fulltime employment and I have expressed your concerns with the top leadership of the company and UAW. Many of the Presidents and Plant Chairman have expressed our displeasure about the way the company has utilized this workforce. I will continue to express these concerns at the leadership meetings and demanding justice for our workforce. Waiting years for full-time employment is an atrocity and should not have been allowed. We must collectively demand better for our Brother and Sister, or slowly watch the demise of our organization at the hands of the company.

ATTENDANCE

The committee and I have received several questions about short term medical justification (Doctor Excuse Notes) and the effects on attendance. Short term illness/injury (T Code) is a chargeable absence and is counted toward absence progression. I believe it is my duty to inform our members of their contractual rights and will continue to provide such information in my Presidents reports. Chargeable absences will include each day the employees' absence is coded AWOL (A Code) or Temporary Illness/Injury (T Code). Employees' absences of three or more consecutive days coded Unpaid Medical Days (M Code), Except FMLA or Workers' Comp approved absences, will result in two (2) chargeable absences.

If Unicare provides accident and sickness benefits and approves a personal medical leave of absence, any unpaid M code day within the medical leave will not be counted as chargeable absence.

Please note that unpaid medical leaves are accepted for three or more consecutive days, if approved by Unicare. Such approved days will not be counted towards chargeable absences.

The rolling measurement period is defined as 12 months (extended by personal medical leaves of absences that occur during the rolling measurement period). This extension is defined as the time between the employee's last day of work and his/her effective return to work from each leave.

- Discipline progression is based on the most recent attendance discipline penalty on record regardless of the number of chargeable absences.
- Discipline will remain on the employee's record for 18 months (extended by personal medical leaves of absence that occur during the period.
- Any additional attendance discipline with 18 months will progress from the most recent discipline penalty
- Attendance discipline will be repeated if the employee has not had a chargeable absence for 9 months or greater from the most recent attendance discipline on record (extended by personal medical leaves of absence that occur during the period).

COMPENSABLE OVERTIME CODES

What are compensable codes and how do they work? Compensable codes generate hours toward the base 40 hours. For example; if a member G codes 3 times in a work week and is scheduled to work overtime, will he/she receive overtime premium? The answer is, yes! The following codes are compensable and will generate hours toward the member's base 40 work week hours.

E excused absence allowance	V vacation
G unpaid voluntary early out	Z bereavement
